# **Application timeline for 2024 entry**

UCAS Undergraduate application opened for 2024 entry.

UCAS application deadline for courses in medicine, veterinary medicine/science, and dentistry, and courses at Oxford or Cambridge.

**UCAS Extra opens.** 

5 September 2023

31 January 2024

5 July 2024

16 May 2023

16 October 2023

28 February **2024** 


First day UCAS can receive a completed application to process.

UCAS equal consideration application deadline.

Last date for applications before Clearing opens.




#### The Basics



- To start an application you need a UCAS Hub account.
- Register for a UCAS Hub account at any time.
- You have up to five choices, unless applying to study medicine, veterinary, medicine/science, dentistry – then it's four choices.
- Applying costs £27.50.
- Apply by the equal consideration date. (31.01)
- Universities and colleges can't see your other choices when you apply.



#### **Personal Statement**

4,000 characters or 47 lines

Your opportunity to speak directly to the person deciding – why should they choose you?

Basis for an interview

You can provide evidence of work experience /additional activities

Important for 'near miss' applications





# Writing your Personal Statement

Imagine you are being interviewed....

'Why do you want to study this subject, and what makes you the right person for the course?'

Your Personal Statement should answer this question

Your Personal Statement may be the only chance you get to stand out from other applicants





## **Personal Statement Tips**

DON'T - repeat information

DON'T - just list achievements & skills

DON'T – begin every sentence with 'I' DON'T - be tempted to plagiarise

DO – Research your choices

DO – draft then re-draft until you are completely happy with it

DO – get external feedback DO – Think carefully about spelling, grammar and vocabulary DO – demonstrate your enthusiasm!
